
To kick off the drive, SVDP members will speak at all Sept. 3rd & 4th liturgies. They will be honoring Ray McGrath, their long-time president.

THE 1908 HOOK & HASTINGS ORGAN: PART I

At all the masses last weekend, Fr. Greenwell spoke briefly about the condition of our pipe organ and its need for refurbishment and repair. In this and next week's columns, I'd like to write in more detail about the organ, focusing not only on the historical significance of the instrument but also on an explanation regarding the types of repairs that are necessary.

Our pipe organ is 108 years old. It was built by the Hook & Hastings Company of Kendall Green, Massachusetts in 1908, the year that the Chicago Cubs last won the World Series. In researching the instrument, I learned that there are only two organs like this west of the Mississippi River, and St. Teresa's is the proud owner of one of them.

As organs go, our Hook & Hastings is a small pipe organ in that it only has one keyboard (or manual) and five ranks. A rank is a set of pipes where each pipe is linked to one key on the keyboard. The keyboard has 61 keys, so each of the first four ranks has 61 pipes. The fifth rank is the pedal keyboard, which has 31 keys (which means that the fifth rank has 31 pipes). Doing the math, our organ has a total of 275 pipes, which are housed in a wooden chest and console that sits in the middle of our choir loft.

A stop is usually linked to a rank of pipes. Basically, a stop mimics a particular musical instrument, such as a flute stop or trumpet stop. On larger instruments, a stop may engage several ranks of pipes, and such a stop is called a mixture. Our instrument, however, has only five stops: 8' Gedeckt, 4' Flute, 8' Dolce, 8' Diapason, and a 16' Bourdon (pedal).

Most modern pipe organs are electro-mechanical, which means that, when the organist depresses a key, an electric current trips a relay which opens a valve that allows air to pass into the pipe, creating the sound. Our organ, however, was built prior to the widespread use of electricity; it is not electro-mechanical but is a tracker organ. In a tracker organ, the entire mechanism from the key to the pipe is mechanical, which means that when the organist depresses a key, the action from the key to the pipe is conveyed mechanically, not electrically. It is the organist – not an electric relay – who "opens the valve and sends air to the pipe". When one plays a tracker organ, as more stops are opened more physical effort is required to play the instrument. Also: because a tracker organ is mechanical, at low volume levels one often hears soft clicking noises as mechanical devices open and close valves supplying air to the pipes.

By most standards, our Hook & Hastings Organ is a small instrument . . . but that's OK: this organ is designed, not for concert performances, but to accompany congregational singing at worship. Given that St. Teresa's has such fine acoustics, the organ is guite adequate for our worship space and liturgical needs.

What is the organ worth? That is hard to say. I have been told that, should we want to replace this instrument with a new pipe organ of similar size, the cost (including installation) would be in the neighborhood of about \$200,000. However, for historic reasons the organ might be worth far more than its replacement cost. It is a finely made musical instrument that is more than 100 years old, and it is also an important historical artifact. Very few organs of this type remain anywhere in the country, and hardly any of them are as perfectly original as this one.

Next week, in Part II of this column, I'll go into more detail with respect to the repair and restoration of the instrument
