Music and the Liturgy: Background and Guidelines

When the initial liturgical reforms took place following the Second Vatican Council there were three major changes in the liturgy. The first change concerned *language*: the vernacular language of the people replaced the Latin that had been used for centuries. The second change dealt with *space*: essentially, we "rearranged furniture" so that the presider no longer had his back to the people but now faced the assembly. The third change involved *music*: to facilitate "full, conscious, and active participation", the assembly was encouraged to sing, not only the mass parts, but hymns as well. Almost overnight Catholic parishes changed from assemblies that sang nothing to assemblies that sang everything, and an early, frequent observation was that our church now looked more "protestant" because we did so much singing!

Unfortunately, in all too many parishes the singing consisted of what became known as the "four hymn syndrome". These parishes simply sang hymns at four points during the liturgy (entrance, offertory, communion, and dismissal), neglecting the common parts of the Mass. Over the years, guidelines for incorporating music into the liturgy developed. Although not officially written down, the consensus among liturgists and musicians is that the principles for incorporating music might look something like this:

- The first things to be sung – if we were to do *minimal* singing – would be these four mass parts: the *Alleluia* before the Gospel, the *Sanctus* (Holy, Holy), the *Acclamation* following the consecration, and the *Great Amen*.
- The next music to be added might be hymns: entrance, communion, recessional, and offertory.
- In addition to or instead of hymns, one might choose to include the *Kyrie* (Lord have mercy) and/or *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God).
- The *Gloria* (Glory to God) – which is used on Sundays, major feasts, and solemnities – should be sung rather than spoken.
- The *Psalms Response* (following the first reading) may be spoken or sung, but like the *Gloria*, a sung response is preferred to a spoken one.
- The *Creed* – which is also reserved to Sundays and solemnities – is usually spoken (but it may be sung).
- Finally, the *last* music to be sung would be any type of solo performance, be it by an individual singer or choir.

The underlying purpose of including any music in the liturgy is that it should encourage "full, conscious, and active participation" by the assembly. For this reason, the singing of the common Mass parts takes precedence over all other music, followed by the use of familiar hymns and responses.
