## DECEMBER 17<sup>TH</sup> - 23<sup>RD</sup>: THE "O" ANTIPHONS

"O come, O come, Emmanuel! And ransom captive Israel That mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel!"

This week I want to write about one of my favorite hymns. For as long as I can remember I have been spellbound by the familiar Advent hymn, *O come, O come, Emmanuel!* The beautiful, e-minor plain chant has captivated me since I was a boy, and I suspect that many of you are also intrigued by this mysterious, haunting melody. Yet most of us probably do not know the background of this 12<sup>th</sup> century Latin hymn. What follows, then, is "the rest of the story".

The text is a setting of the *O Antiphons*, which are used in Advent Vespers from December 17<sup>th</sup> – 23<sup>rd</sup>. During this octave before Christmas the Advent liturgy undergoes a subtle and remarkable metamorphosis. The second Advent Preface – which may be used beginning on December 17<sup>th</sup> – shifts the focus from Christ's second coming at the end of time to the imminent celebration of his first coming at Christmas. At the same time, the Evening Prayer of the Church (Vespers) anticipates Christmas with the *O Antiphons*. The importance of these antiphons is twofold. First, each antiphon is a title of the Messiah, and secondly, each antiphon refers to a prophecy from the Prophet Isaiah.

Notice that the *O Antiphons* end on December 23<sup>rd</sup>. This is because, in the Church, the day begins not at dawn but at sundown the day before. Hence, we begin to celebrate Christmas with evening masses on December 24<sup>th</sup>, just as we may celebrate the Sunday liturgy on Saturday night.

The exact origin of the *O Antiphons* is not known, but we think they were developed in Benedictine monasteries. We do know they may have appeared as early as the sixth century, and by the eighth century they were used in liturgical celebrations in Rome. In medieval times the usage of the *O Antiphons* was so prevalent in monasteries that the phrases "Keep your O" and "The Great O Antiphons" were common parlance.

On a final note: the Benedictine monks arranged these antiphons with a definite purpose. Referring to the above table, if one starts with the last title and takes the first letter of each one – Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia – the Latin words ero cras are formed, meaning, "Tomorrow, I will come".
