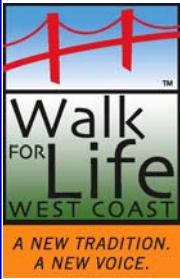


We will be offering the Sacrament of Anointing at all Masses this Weekend.

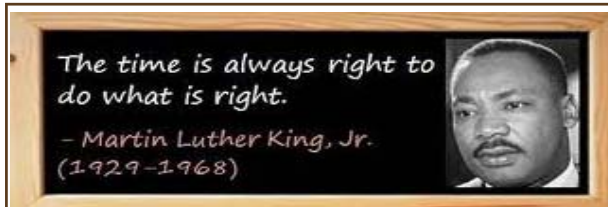

THE LITURGICAL YEAR: ORDINARY TIME

This weekend is the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, and it's the first time we've worn green vestments since November 24th of last year. We'll be in Ordinary Time for the next seven weeks, as Ash Wednesday is not until March 5th. But what exactly is "Ordinary Time"?

First of all, "ordinary time" is a bit of a misnomer, since there is nothing "ordinary" about the Eucharist or the Mass. The term "ordinary time" is a translation of the Latin term *tempus per annum* (literally "time through the year"), and perhaps the best way to define "ordinary time" is to distinguish it from the other times and seasons that make up the liturgical calendar.

The most important "time" of the liturgical year is the Lent-Easter season. In 2014, the 40-days of Lent begin on March 5th (Ash Wednesday), with Easter being unusually late this year (April 20th). The Easter Season runs for 50-days from Easter through Pentecost, which means that, when coupled with the 40-days of Lent, the Lent-Easter season contains 90 days, or approximately one-fourth of the calendar year.

Last Sunday we brought to a close the other major season of the liturgical year, Advent-Christmas. There are four Sundays of Advent prior to the feast of Christmas, and the Christmas season continues through two Sundays following the New Year. In the United States, these two Sundays usually celebrate the Epiphany and the Baptism of the Lord.

Of the 52 Sundays in the year, 13 are contained in the Lent-Easter Season and 6 or 7 make up the Advent-Christmas Cycle. Depending on the day of the week for Christmas and the calendar date of Ash Wednesday, there are either 33 or 34 Sundays in "Ordinary Time".

Last Monday we resumed "Ordinary Time". Ordinary Time runs from the day following the Baptism of the Lord until Ash Wednesday, and – following the Lent-Easter season – it resumes on the Monday after Pentecost. Ordinary time continues until the First Sunday of Advent, and the Last Sunday of Ordinary Time is also the Feast of Christ the King.

In Ordinary Time, when major feasts fall on a Sunday they sometimes take precedence over the Sunday Readings and Prayers. An example of this will take place in a couple of weeks, when the Feast of the Presentation (February 2nd) supercedes the Fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time. It happens again on June 29th when the Solemnity of Sts. Peter & Paul trumps the Sunday celebration. Additionally, when a Holy Day of Obligation (the Assumption or All Saints' Day) falls on a Sunday, the Holy Day is celebrated and white vestments are worn instead of green.

With respect to liturgical colors, there are four: green, purple, white, and red. Green is worn during ordinary time; purple is the color of Advent and Lent; white is used during the seasons of Christmas and Easter; and red is reserved for Palm Sunday, Good Friday, and feasts celebrating apostles, martyrs, or the Holy Spirit.
