DINING IN THE KINGDOM OF GOD

Now that Easter, Trinity Sunday, and *Corpus Christi* are behind us, we return to green vestments and ordinary time. This year we are in the Cycle C, which means that, from now until the end of November, we will be reading from the Gospel of Luke.

Luke the Evangelist is, perhaps, the best writer in the New Testament. A convert to Christianity, tradition states that Luke was a physician from Macedonia who accompanied Paul on at least one of his missionary journeys. Luke also wrote the *Acts of the Apostles*, which chronicles the history of the early Church from the Ascension of Jesus until the deaths of Peter and Paul.

Luke has the most elaborate description of the events surrounding the Birth of Christ. Whereas Matthew's account focuses on Joseph, Luke's focus is on the person of Mary. The *Annunciation* and *Visitation* are found only in Luke, as is the story of Jesus being lost in the Temple at about the age of twelve. Additionally, some of our most beloved parables – such as the *Prodigal Son* and *Good Samaritan* – are found only in Luke's Gospel.

One of the other "characteristics" of Luke's Gospel – which is not immediately apparent – is the presence of eleven "meal stories". This Sunday's Gospel (Lk 7:36-50) is one of those stories. In today's Gospel, a "sinful woman" crashes a dinner party given in Jesus' honor at the house of Simon the Pharisee. The woman washes Jesus' feet with her tears, anoints them with oil, and dries them with her hair. This prompts a lively exchange among those present, with Jesus using the occasion to teach about God's mercy, forgiveness, and compassion.

Eugene LaVerdiere, a scripture scholar whose specialty is Luke, has written a book titled *Dining in the Kingdom of God: The Origins of the Eucharist in the Gospel of Luke*. LaVerdiere suggests that these meal stories serve as a frame for the entire Gospel. His thesis certainly has merit and deserves our attention. Below are the eleven meal stories discussed in his book:

- A Banquet in the House of Levi (5:27-39)
- Dinner at the House of Simon the Pharisee (7:36-50)
- Feeding the Crowd with Loaves and Fish at Bethsaida (9:10-17)
- At the Home of Martha and Mary (10:38-42)
- Another Meal at the Home of a Pharisee (11:37-54)
- A Cure, Two Parables, and a Sabbath Dinner in the Home of a Pharisee (14:1-24)
- A Scandal: Dinner at the House of the Tax Collector, Zacchaeus (19:1-10)
- Peter and John: Preparation for the Passover Meal (22:7-13)
- The Passover/Last Supper (22:14-38)
- Breaking Bread with the Two Disciples at Emmaus (24:13-25)
- Eating with the Disciples in Jerusalem after the Resurrection (24:36-53)

As we work our way through Cycle C we will encounter many of these meals stories. What I would like to suggest is that, for those of you who read scripture on a regular basis, you try a "selective reading" of the Gospel of Luke. Simply read through these eleven stories and see what themes and ideas emerge.
