THE LITURGICAL YEAR: ORDINARY TIME

The green vestments are back! With few exceptions, the priest will be vested in green from now until the end of November . . . which means that we are in "Ordinary Time". But what does that mean?

First of all, "ordinary time" is a bit of a misnomer, since there is nothing "ordinary" about the Eucharist or the Mass. The term "ordinary time" is a translation of the Latin term *tempus per annum* (literally "time through the year"), and perhaps the best way to define "ordinary time" is to distinguish it from the other times and seasons that make up the liturgical calendar.

The most important "time" of the liturgical year is the Lent-Easter season. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and continues until Easter Sunday, with the Easter Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday) belonging both to the end of Lent and the beginning of the Paschal Celebration. The Easter Season runs from Easter through Pentecost, a total of 50 days. When coupled with the 40-days of Lent, this Lent-Easter season contains 90 days, approximately one-fourth of the calendar year.

The other major season of the liturgical year surrounds the celebration of the Lord's birth at Christmas. There are four Sundays of Advent prior to the feast of Christmas, and the Christmas season continues through two Sundays following the New Year. In the United States, these two Sundays usually celebrate the Epiphany and the Baptism of the Lord, the feast which officially concludes the Christmas Season.

Of the 52 weeks in the year, 12 1/2 are contained in the Lent-Easter Season with up to 7 weeks in the Advent-Christmas season. Depending on the day of the week of Christmas and the date of Ash Wednesday, there could be either 33 or 34 weeks in "Ordinary Time".

Ordinary Time runs from the day following the Baptism of the Lord until Ash Wednesday, resuming on the Monday after Pentecost and continuing until the First Sunday of Advent. Technically speaking, we have been in Ordinary Time since May 28th, but the green vestments haven't appeared until today because, on the two Sundays following Pentecost, we celebrate the Trinity Sunday and *Corpus Christi*.

Sometimes when major feasts fall on a Sunday they take precedence over the "Sunday in Ordinary Time." Two examples of this occur when the Triumph of the Cross (September 14th – red vestments) or the Feast of St. John Lateran (November 9th – white vestments) falls on a Sunday. And when a Holy Day of Obligation falls on a Sunday (the Assumption, August 15th or All Saints' Day, November 1st), white vestments are worn and the solemnity is celebrated.

The Solemnity of Christ the King is the Last Sunday of Ordinary Time. White Vestments are worn on this day, and the following Sunday is the First Sunday of Advent, marking the beginning of a new liturgical year.
