THE CURIOUS STORY OF THE MIRACLE AT NAIM

This weekend Fr. David Costello of the Discalced Carmelites is speaking at all the Masses for the Diocesan Mission Appeal. I'm not sure whether he'll be speaking on the readings of the day, so this week's column will take a look at those passages.

Today's C-cycle Gospel, taken from Luke, is a story that we hear only once every three years: the raising of the widow's son. In this passage Jesus, journeying to the city of Naim, encounters a funeral procession of a man who had died, the only son of a widow. Moved with pity, Jesus commands the man to arise. He sits up, begins to speak, and then Jesus returns him to his mother.

What is unusual about this story is that it appears in only one gospel, the Gospel of Luke. This prompted me to take a look at the other "resurrection" stories in the gospel texts.

The most famous "resurrection" story is found in the Gospel of John: the Raising of Lazarus (Chapter 11). We are most familiar with this story because it is usually read on the Fifth Sunday of Lent, as well as at many funeral liturgies. Like today's Gospel from Luke, the Raising of Lazarus appears only in one gospel (John); Matthew, Mark, and Luke make no mention of either Lazarus' death or Jesus' bringing him back to life.

Looking further, there are two other "borderline resurrection" stories, one each in Mark and John. In Mark we have the cure of Jarius' daughter (Mk 5:21-24, 35-43); in John we have the cure of the royal official's son (4:46-54). Both narratives involve sick children who are in danger of death. In Mark the crowd believes that the girl is already dead, and they scoff at Jesus when he says that she is only sleeping. In John, the royal official wants Jesus to return with him to his home and heal his son. Jesus says, "You may go; your son will live," and – as we learn later – the fever left the boy at about the time that Jesus said he would live.

Notice that neither Jarius' daughter nor the royal official's son are confirmed as dead. Thus, when we look at the Gospels, there are only two stories of Jesus actually bringing someone back to life: the Raising of Lazarus and today's gospel involving the Widow of Naim.

One would think that today's gospel would be especially well-known and popular (after all: curing a person is one thing; bringing a person back from death is another!). Yet most Christians are probably unaware of this story in Luke, given that it is read perhaps only once every three years. It is also odd that the other evangelists make no mention of either the daughter of Jarius or the royal official's son. One would think that, because bringing a dead person back to life is such an extraordinary event, all four evangelists would be eager to include all of these stories in their gospel accounts. That each story appears in only one gospel is a curiosity, indeed!

A final note: in assembling the Lectionary, the first reading – usually taken from the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament) – is chosen to correspond to the Gospel of the day. Today's first reading (1 Kgs 17:17-24) focuses on a widow and her infant son. The boy, suffering a severe sickness that caused him to stop breathing, is cured through the intercession and prayer of the Prophet Elijah. Note how closely today's gospel parallels the story found in today's first reading from 1 Kings.
