NOVEMBER 9TH: THE DEDICATION OF ST. JOHN LATERAN

Today is the most unusual feast day in the entire liturgical year. The Dedication of St. John Lateran does not commemorate a historical event (such as the Birth or Resurrection of Christ); it is not an "idea feast" (such as Christ the King or the Immaculate Conception); nor is it a day to remember a Saint (like St. Francis of Assisi or St. Patrick). No, today we commemorate a buildina.

You heard me right, a building: St. John Lateran, the first Church built in the city of Rome. Essentially, this is the cathedral church of Rome, and St. John Lateran - not St. Peter's - is the Pope's Church (remember: first and foremost, the Pope is the Bishop of Rome). The Church was dedicated by Pope Sylvester in 318 AD, five years after the Edict of Milan (313 AD) legalized Christianity in the empire. The church has been rebuilt several times following sackings, earthquakes, and fires, and the present structure dates from the 17th century.

Why so much fuss about a Church? Two reasons. First, St. John Lateran, as one of the first Churches in the city of Rome, is the "Mother Church" of Christianity. The inscription over the entrance reads, "Mother and Head of all the churches in the City and in the world". Secondly, from the early 4th century until the Avignon Papacy (14th century), the popes resided at the Lateran Palace. It was not until the 15th century that popes lived in what is now the Vati-

Here is born a people of noble race, destined for Heaven, whom the Spirit brings forth in the waters he has made fruitful. Mother Church conceives her offspring by the breath of God, and bears them virginally in this water.

Hope for the Kingdom of Heaven, you who are reborn in this font. Eternal life does not await those who are only born once. This is the spring of life that waters the whole world, taking its origin from the Wounds of Christ. Sinner, to be purified, go down into the holy water. It receives the unregenerate and brings him forth a new man. If you wish to be made innocent, be cleansed in this pool, whether you are weighed down by original sin or your own. There is no barrier between those who are reborn and made one

by the one font, the one Spirit, and the one faith. Let neither the number nor the kind of their sins terrify anyone; Once reborn in this water, they will be holy.



What I find most fascinating about this church is the baptistry, pictured above. The font area is surrounded by eight pillars with Ionic and Corinthian capitals, and the font itself looks like a bathtub, but it's not. Rather, it's a sarcophagus: a funeral receptacle for a corpse, which was usually carved in stone and displayed above ground. In other words, early Christian catechumens were initiated into the church by being baptized in what is, in effect, a coffin.

The pillars support a dome inscribed with a Latin text attributed to Pope Sixtus III (432-440), a translation of which is provided to the left of the photo. The text speaks most eloquently our theology of baptism, and rather than try to offer any further explanation and analysis, I'd like to suggest that you simply allow the text and image to soak in.
