THE TWO RITES OF BAPTISM

This weekend, those parishioners attending the 10 am Sunday Liturgy will witness something quite out of the ordinary. Elise Carol Miranda, the infant daughter of Elaine Ng and Edward Miranda, will be baptized. Her older sibling, 11-year old Jasmine Kit-Man Miranda, will also be received into the Church. Jasmine, however, will not simply be baptized: she will be fully initiated, receiving the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Eucharist. Why is this so?

Jasmine will receive all three sacraments because, in the eyes of the Church, she is an *adult*. This may sound strange to speak of an 11-year old as an adult, but according to the Canon Law of the Church, there are only two distinctions of person: one is either an infant or an adult. In the language of the Church there is no distinction between children, teenagers, adolescents, or young adults. For the purpose of sacraments, one is either an infant or an adult.

For the "old timers" among us, we might remember back to our early religious training when we employed a term known as the *age of discretion*. From a catechetical point of view, the age of discretion is a stage in a person's development when he or she is able to distinguish between right and wrong, between sin and grace. It is also an age when the person is able to appreciate and understand the mystery of the Eucharist, how Christ is really present in the bread and wine. Canon lawyers settled on the age of seven as the age of discretion, and, normally, it is at about this age that a person makes his or her first confession and receives Eucharist for the first time.

Normally, this does not present a problem. Most Catholics are baptized as infants and first receive the sacraments of Penance and Eucharist at about the age of seven. But what happens when a person is not baptized as an infant?

When a person reaches the age of discretion that person is treated as an adult. And, according to the Canon Law of the Church, when an adult is baptized he or she must be fully initiated, receiving the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist as well. This is the practice articulated in the Rite of Christian Initiation (RCIA) which was restored following the Second Vatican Council. Normally, Christian Initiation is celebrated at the Easter Vigil, and when a priest presides at an adult baptism he must confirm the person as well.

The special circumstances of today's liturgy involve Jasmine's being initiated into the Church outside of the Easter Vigil. Jasmine attends St. Anne's Catholic School and has received catechetical and sacramental instruction. She is prepared to receive the initiation sacraments and wanted to do so on this day, not only because her infant sister is being baptized, but also because her family has traveled from other parts of the country to celebrate this day. In order to celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation apart from the Easter Vigil, permission must be given by the local ordinary, which Archbishop Niederauer has most graciously granted.

There are two different rites at today's liturgy. Both rites involve water and oil, but notice how the prayers and liturgical action differ between the adult and infant rites. The rites are powerful and speak for themselves, and it is an unusual event to experience both rites at the same liturgy.
