"The Journey of a Lifetime" is the story of our lives as disciples of Jesus. Anyone who would like to join a group on this journey is invited to contact Sr. Maureen as soon as possible. The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is a process for adults to:

1. look into the Catholic Church, or
2. learn more about their church if they are already baptized Catholic, or
3. Prepare to receive Eucharist and/or Confirmation if they are Catholic and have not received these Sacraments.

Catholics, people of other faiths and people of no particular faith gather together to share their stories, ask their questions and pray about what God is asking of them. No one is required to join the church.

A group will begin meeting in Avila Hall on Sunday, September 25 after the 10am Mass. All are welcome.

"HAVE MERCY ON US"

Twice during the Liturgy – at the *Kyrie* and at the *Agnus Dei* – we ask the Lord to "have mercy on us". What do we mean when we utter this prayer?

Most would probably suggest that, when God has mercy on us, He spares us from some form of punishment. In this view, God is like the judge who has mercy on a convicted defendant: the judge "has mercy" on the person when he grants clemency or suspends the sentence rather than send the person to prison.

While it is true that God has mercy on us when he spares us from punishment due to sin, this notion of mercy is somewhat limited because it reduces God to nothing more than a judge. The truth is that, in the Bible, mercy is understood in a much broader sense. To put it simply and succinctly, when God has mercy on us it means that God does for us what we cannot do for ourselves.

This notion of mercy has its roots in – of all things – the spoils of war! In the ancient world, when a nation went to war, those left behind had to "tighten their belts," sacrificing, rationing, and getting by with less in order that resources might be directed towards the war effort. When the victors returned home with the spoils, those left behind welcomed the conquering heroes with cries "begging mercy." Essentially, they asked the victors to share with them the spoils of war, providing for them those things that they did not have or could not provide for themselves.

Returning to the Liturgy, let us take, as an example, one of the options from the Penitential Rite, form C:

- *You raise the dead to life in the spirit: Lord, have mercy.*
- *You bring pardon and peace to the sinner: Christ, have mercy.*
- *You bring light to those in darkness: Lord, have mercy.*

Notice how God does for us what we cannot do for ourselves. God "raises the dead," "brings pardon and peace," and "brings light." These are things that we are incapable of doing ourselves, and we plead with God – who is all-powerful and can do all things – to do them for us. Examining the other options for Penitential Rite C, we notice that this pattern is consistently repeated. All of the petitions have virtually nothing to do with the taking away of punishment due to sin. Instead, they deal with the almighty power of God whom we call upon to do those things for us that we cannot do for ourselves.
