

THE TROUBLING PARABLE OF THE WORKERS IN THE VINEYARD

"God created man in his own image. And man, being a gentleman, returned the favor."

— Source Unknown

I begin this week's column with the above quotation — often attributed to Mark Twain, George Bernard Shaw, or Jean-Jacques Rousseau — because I believe it holds the key to unlocking this week's parable. We'll come back to the quote in a minute . . . but first, the parable.

After 34 years of preaching I've come to realize that, for the people in the pews, today's gospel contains the most offensive parable in the entire New Testament. That's not to say that other parables don't upset people. Some become irate over the forgiving father's acceptance of his Prodigal Son, while others are perplexed by the Good Samaritan's compassion on the road to Jericho. But whenever this parable appears (once every three years), the almost universal cry from the assembly is that the behavior of the owner of the vineyard is, well, so <u>unfair!</u> How dare he pay those who worked only an hour the same wage as those who have toiled since sunrise!

Ultimately, this is a parable about God, specifically, about God's generosity. If God wants to pay workers the same amount regardless of how long they worked, why is that a problem? After all, it's God's money! And if God wants to admit the poor, the sick, and the lame to the banquet, that's God's prerogative! After all: it's God's party, and God can allow in anyone he so chooses. For us mere mortals, we find this unsettling. Why? Because we think it's so <u>unfair!</u> Our problem with the parable is that we are looking at the situation through our eyes when we need to look at the situation through God's eyes.

Scripture teaches us that we are made in God's image, after his likeness. We learn this in the story of creation:

"God created man in his image; in the divine image he created him; male and female he created them." (Genesis 1:27)

Unfortunately, we often make the erroneous assumption that because human beings are mirrors of God's image, God is also a mirror of *our* image. We run into a problem when we assume that God thinks and acts like <u>us</u>. Hence the ironic relevance of our opening quote from the "Source Unknown".

In the Scriptures, God periodically reminds us of how different he is from us. In today's first reading, God, speaking through the prophet Isaiah, tells us that:

"... my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts." (Is 55:8-9)

And – if we look back to the Gospel which we read two weeks ago – we recall that Jesus reprimanded Peter with similar words: "Get behind me You are thinking not as God does but as human beings do." (Mt 16:23)

To make sense out of today's parable we have to change our perspective. Instead of looking at it through human eyes, we have to look at it through the eyes of God.
